CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I:

NAME

This Fellowship shall be called the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

ARTICLE II:

MEMBERSHIP

This Fellowship in session shall be composed of three (3) messengers per cooperating church with resident membership of fifty (50) or less and one (1) additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) resident members or major fraction thereof or one (1) additional messenger for each \$500 contributed through the Cooperative Program, except that no church may have more than ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III:

PURPOSE

Section 1. This Fellowship is a nonprofit corporation through which Southern Baptists may work harmoniously in cooperation in promoting all enterprises they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

Section 2. This Fellowship, in keeping with its stated purpose, shall not attempt to exercise control over the cooperating churches.

Section 3. This Corporation is organized, and will always operate, exclusively for religious purposes, and no part of the net earnings of this Corporation inure, or will ever inure, to the benefit of any individual or of any private shareholder, there being no shareholders. None of the income of this organization may inure to the benefits of any private individual or members and the assets of the Corporation are irrevocably dedicated to and for religious purposes, and upon dissolution of the Corporation, the Executive Board of the Corporation will cause the assets of the Corporation to be distributed, after the payment of creditors, to an organization which will use said assets exclusively for religious purposes.

ARTICLE IV:

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Fellowship shall be a president, vice president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, and such other officers as the Fellowship may deem necessary.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the members present and voting at the annual meeting of the Fellowship. They shall take office at the close of the annual Fellowship meeting, and hold office until their successors are elected and installed.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V:

EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Fellowship shall elect an Executive Board as set forth in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VI: COMMITTEES

The committees of the Fellowship shall be a Nominating Committee, Program Committee, a Committee on Committees and such other committees as are needed to carry out its work.

ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Fellowship shall meet at such time and place as may be designated by the Fellowship at its annual meeting.
- Section 2. In an emergency the president of the Fellowship, acting in cooperation with the Executive Board, may change the time and/or place of the regular annual meeting.
- Section 3. In an emergency the president of the Fellowship, acting in cooperation with the Executive Board, may call a special meeting of the Fellowship.

ARTICLE VIII: CONTRIBUTIONS AND FUNDS

- Section 1. The Cooperative Program shall be the chief means through which the Fellowship shall support its missionary endeavors.
- Section 2. All funds of this Fellowship shall be raised by voluntary contributions, provided this does not prevent acquiring funds of property by bequest or use of any income property that may be bequeathed to or purchased by the Fellowship.
- Section 3. All designated gifts accepted by this Fellowship shall by used strictly according to the expressed will and direction of the donor.

ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

- (1) Presenting copies of the proposed amendment(s) to the messengers while the Fellowship is in session.
- (2) Proposed amendment(s) shall lie over until the next regular meeting of the Fellowship.
- (3) Proposed amendment(s) shall require two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the messengers voting.

BYLAWS

I: TERRITORY

The territory to be served by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship is North Dakota, South Dakota and other areas.

II: OFFICERS

Officers shall be elected annually. Officers shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot. The president and vice president shall be eligible to serve two (2) years in succession. Other officers may serve indefinitely.

III: EXECUTIVE BOARD

- Section 1. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend persons to the Fellowship for election to the Executive Board.
- Section 2. The Board shall be elected to represent the total area and not as associational representatives.
- Section 3. Each association with four (4) churches and two hundred (200) resident members may have one (1) Board member, and one (1) additional Board member when they reach four hundred (400), eight hundred (800), and twelve hundred (1200) resident members. No association may have more than four (4) Board members. One (1) representative from a language congregation shall serve a three (3) year term on the Executive Board.
- Section 4. Employees of Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall not be eligible to serve on the Executive Board except as advisors or non voting ex-officio members. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall serve as an advisory member and consultant to the Executive Board and all Fellowship committees.
- **Section 5**. Board members eligible to serve are those who have been in the Fellowship area a minimum of six (6) months and whose churches contribute at least quarterly through the Cooperative Program.
- Section 6. The term of office shall be three (3) years. Members elected to unexpired terms may serve out the term and be eligible for one (1) full term. No member shall be eligible to serve more than six (6) years until a minimum of one (1) year has elapsed. A member moving from the association from which he/she has been chosen automatically goes off the Board.
- **Section 7**. The Executive Board has authority to act for the Fellowship between regular meetings of the Fellowship except that it cannot impose its will on the Fellowship by rescinding or contradicting any action taken in a regular Fellowship meeting.
- Section 8. Members of the Executive Board shall be elected by the Fellowship in session upon recommendation of the Fellowship nominating committee. The Nominating Committee may receive suggestions from the associations. The Nominating Committee shall appoint persons to the Executive Board to fill vacancies on the Board until such unexpired terms are filled by action of the Fellowship at the next regular meeting of the Fellowship.

- **Section 9**. The president, vice president, recording secretary and assistant recording secretary of the Fellowship shall be members of the Executive Board.
- **Section 10**. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year on a date suggested by the Fellowship Director and approved by the Executive Board. Fifty percent (50%) of the Board members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting.
- Section 11. The Executive Board shall organize itself as described within the Executive Board Manual.
- Section 12. The Executive Board shall act as the authorized legal agent for the Fellowship.

IV: AGENCIES

- Section 1. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend ministers and laity to the Fellowship to serve as directors or trustees of all agencies.
- Section 2. There shall be at least six (6) members elected to serve as directors or trustees of all agencies.
- Section 3. Elected members of all agencies shall be maintained on a rotation basis with one-third (1/3) serving a one (1) year term, one-third (1/3) serving a two (2) year term, and one-third (1/3) serving a three (3) year term.
- Section 4. The term of office for members of all agencies shall be three (3) years. No member shall serve more than six (6) years until one (1) year has elapsed.
- Section 5. Should vacancies occur on any agency, the Fellowship nominating committee shall, in consultation with the directors of trustees and committees of the agency, bring recommendations to the Executive Board to fill such vacancies until the next regular session of the Fellowship.
- **Section 6**. Every agency shall organize itself by the election of appropriate officers immediately following the annual meeting.
- Section 7. Every agency shall organize committees as is necessary for the fulfillment of its responsibilities and determine the authority of each committee.
- Section 8. Each member of every agency shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church which is in cooperation with the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

V: FELLOWSHIP EMPLOYÉES

- Section 1. The Executive Board shall employ all Fellowship personnel, except office secretaries.
- Section 2. The Executive Director shall employ all office secretaries in counsel with department directors.

Section 3. The Executive Director shall give general supervision and/or counsel to the work of the Fellowship through its departments and agencies. He shall receive and retain in the Fellowship office all historical data.

Section 4. The Executive Director and all department directors shall present a written report of their stewardship to the Fellowship at the annual meeting.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall contract with all employed personnel on an indefinite time basis, and a thirty-day (30) notice shall be given by either party of the desire to end the contract, except by mutual agreement.

Section 6. The Executive Director shall serve ex-officio, without voting, on all committees, and aid by furnishing information, printed materials and needed guidance for the work of the committees.

Section 7. There shall be a Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship policy manual setting forth all policies, procedures and practices for all Fellowship employees.

VI: COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees shall consist of at least five (5) members appointed by the president of the Fellowship in consultation with the vice president of the Fellowship. This committee shall appoint the Resolutions Committee, the Time-Place-Preacher Committee, the Nominating Committee. All special committees authorized by the Fellowship shall be appointed by the President of the Committee on Committees.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee, consisting of one representative from each association, shall be responsible for nominating persons to the Executive Board and all Fellowship agencies.

Section 3. The Program Committee of the Fellowship shall consist of the president, the vice president, the Executive Director of the Fellowship, the host pastor, the WMU president, the Brotherhood president, and the president of the Pastor's Conference.

Section 4. The president, vice president, and Fellowship Director shall serve as ex-officio members of all Fellowship committees of which they are not already a part.

Section 5. Ex-officio committee members shall serve in an advisory capacity only.

VII: AMENDMENTS

The Bylaws may be amended in the following manner:

- At any regular meeting of the Fellowship except the last session.
- (2) An amendment must be presented in writing and copies made available to the messengers at either the first or second session.
- (3) Voted on at a stated time during a subsequent session.
- (4) Receive two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those voting.

VIII: RULES OF ORDER

The New Testament and Robert's Rule of Order Revised shall govern the conduct of the proceedings of the Fellowship, not otherwise provided for in the constitution or bylaws.

3. 1997 BAKER STATE MISSION OFFERING REPORT

The Executive Board approved in 1997 a Baker State Mission Offering goal of \$15,000 and received \$14,246.34. Receipts were allocated as follows:

Emergencies: \$7,123.17

50% is to be used for church and pastor emergencies. These may include help with moving pastors onto the field or temporary assistance with pastors' salaries.

This also includes other emergency situations when help is needed.

New Work: \$4,986.22

35% will be used to promote and develop new work within the Dakota Fellowship.

Presently we have 97 churches and missions.

The remaining 15% will be utilized as follows:

Camps: \$305.28

Help with summer camps for children, youth and Acteens Impact.

Internationals: Ministry to students from other countries. Many accept Christ while attending our colleges and universities. They become witnesses to their families and

friends upon returning home.

Student Work: \$305.28

Help with local Baptist Student Directors' ministry to students. Assistance for Student summer missionaries as they serve in the Dakota Fellowship and other

North American Mission areas.

Mission VBS: \$305.28

Help with Mission Vacation Bible Schools. This could include purchase of materials and refreshments, meeting place rentals, and other expenses.

Evangelism Tents: Assistance in the upkeep of tents used for crusade evangelism. \$305.28

VIM Ministry: Assistance in enlisting, coordinating and promoting Volunteers in Missions Ministry in the Dakotas. Also, help with a BNF (Baptist Nursing Fellowship)

missions project.

Resort Ministry: Assistance in missions outreach to campgrounds in the resort areas of the Dakotas. \$305.28

5. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR POSITION

On February 4, 1998, the Executive Board voted on the nomination of William E. Pope for the position of Executive Director of the Southern Baptist Fellowship. The nomination did not receive the required 75% vote.

In the Executive Board meeting of March 16-17, 1998, William E. Pope resigned as Interim Executive Director effective May 1, 1998. Subsequently, the Board asked James L. Goodson to become Executive Director on an interim basis effective May 1, 1998.

On October 3, 1998, the Executive Board elected Wilford Daniel Lindsey as DSBF Executive Director effective November 1, 1998.

6. FOUNDATION BOARD MEMBERS

The Executive Board in its June meeting received recommendations from the Nominating Committee regarding persons to fill vacancies on the Foundation board. The Executive Board returned the nominations to the Nominating Committee with the request that additional information be provided on the nominees and that the Nominating Committee seek individuals with experience in fund raising.

7. BUDGET DEVELOPMENT BASE

The Executive Board affirmed in its June meeting that annual budgets will be built on the twelve-month Cooperative Program income from the previous July 1 - June 30 period. The Executive Board will determine in its March 2000 meeting how to allocate Cooperative Program income received in 1999 above the base budget.

8. BOARD COMMITTEE TASK ASSIGNMENTS

The Board revised task assignments to its committees in the June meeting. The revisions eliminated the supervisory function of those committees in relation to the Director of Evangelism, Student Work, WMU, and Church Services. Those responsibilities were replaced with assignments to those committees pertaining to their work with the Executive Director in interviewing and recommending personnel and acting on the recommendation of the Executive Director regarding probation or termination. The Board also expressly stated a role in evaluating the Executive Director's performance annually, making annual staff salary adjustments, and participating with staff in developing and implementing a long-range strategy plan.

9. REPORT ON WEST RIVER MISSIONARY POSITION

The Executive Board received and accepted Loyd Nielson's letter of resignation in its June meeting.

10. NORTH AND SOUTH VALLEY ASSOCIATIONS

The Executive Board received a report in its June meeting regarding the creation of North and South Valley Associations. The Board adopted five recommendations based on the report.

- a. The Executive Board will allow an invited observer from South Valley Association to be in attendance at Board meetings thereby giving South Valley time to meet the requirements for Board membership and simultaneously giving them an information vehicle.
- The Board terminated Preston North's services based on a request from the North Valley Association.
- c. The Executive Directors was authorized to prepare a severance package in cooperation with the North American Mission Board with salary and benefits for Preston North extending through November 30, 1998. On-field service ended July 31, 1998.
- d. North and South Valley were offered their choice of either an Executive Board/Association search committee process or a Cooperative Agreement process whereby they would do their own search for a Director of Missions
- The Executive Director was instructed to share full information regarding the above actions with all pastors in North and South Valley.

11. DAKOTA SOUTHERN BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP/ASSOCIATIONAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

In its June meeting the Board adopted an Associational Cooperative Agreement and authorized the Executive Director to negotiate its adoption by each association.

12. PASTORAL ASSISTANCE

Board members requested in their March meeting additional information on pastoral assistance. Full information was given to the Board in June on all churches receiving pastoral aid. In its June meeting the Board also adopted pastoral aid guidelines and approval procedures involving associational Directors of Missions and appropriate DSBF staff.

13. DSBF OFFICER AND COMMITTEE JOB DESCRIPTIONS

The Board adopted in its June meeting job descriptions for the DSBF President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Committee on Committees, Program Committee, Resolutions Committee, Nominating Committee, and the Time-Place-Preacher Committee.

14. DSBF PERSONNEL MANUAL

In its June meeting the Board adopted a new DSBF Personnel Manual which it is to review and revise annually.

15. POLICY ON DSBF CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE CHURCH ANNUITY PLAN

On August 25, the Executive Board adopted a policy which requires a church's contributions to the Cooperation Program be at least equal to the cost of funding the DSBF participation level in church staff annuity. Exceptions may be granted to weak, struggling churches.

16. DSBF OFFICE BUILDING

The Board decided in its August meeting to appoint a sub-committee following the 1998 Annual Meeting to determine the best course of action regarding a headquarters building for the DSBF. The sub-committee is to bring its report to the March, 1999, Executive Board meeting

17. TRANSFER OF THE LOAN AND GRANT PROGRAMS FROM THE DSBF FOUNDATION TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

At the request of the Foundation, the Executive Board accepted responsibility for the loan and grants program in its August meeting. The Board made no changes in guidelines, application procedures, or forms pending further detailed review.

18. HUNGER OFFERING

On August 25, the Executive Board adopted a policy which would retain 25% of all hunger funds collected for use in the Dakotas. The remaining 75% would be sent to the SBC Executive Committee for disbursement to appropriate agencies.

19. AMENDMENTS TO THE CHURCH ANNUITY PLAN

The Executive Board approved on August 25 amendments and resolutions to the church annuity plan.

20. REVISION OF THE DSBF DOCUMENT BASE

The Board voted on August 25 to review/revise existing constitutions and by-laws and create a policies and procedures manual. All of this material is subsequently the responsibility of the Executive Board serving 1998-1999 with any necessary constitution/by-law recommendations/revisions egoing to the 1999 Annual Meeting of the DSBF.

21. PROPOSED BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS

Slight changes were made in the proposed 1999 budget. Those changes will appear in the budget presented to the Annual Meeting.

22. CLARIFICATION OF SOUTH VALLEY ASSOCIATION OBSERVER STATUS

The Executive Board voted on October 3, 1998, to pay expenses for the South Valley Association moderator to attend full Board meetings. He will be allowed to speak when recognized by the chair. He will not be allowed to vote.

EXECUTIVE BOARD RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE DSBF ANNUAL MEETING

The Executive Board recommends that the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship adopt a 1999 basic budget of \$1,025,061. The Cooperative Program base for the budget is \$194,008 with 14% of that amount designated for SBC causes. Receipts above the basic Cooperative Program budget amount will be utilized in a manner determined by the Executive Board in its annual March meeting in the year 2000.

In its June meeting the Executive Board adopted a budget procedure that requires future budgets to be built on Cooperative Program income from July 1 one year to June 30 the succeeding year. Outside income combined with the Cooperative Program amount received in the previous twelve-month period would constitute the monetary base for a budget proposal.

The Cooperative Program income for July 1, 1997, through June 30, 1998, was slightly more than \$194,000. The North American Mission Board, Baptist Sunday School Board (LifeWay Ministries), and the Florida Baptist Convention have all made financial commitments reflected in the budget proposal. In addition, \$13,725 has been set aside from 1998 funds for 1999 LifeWay Ministries programs. Interest income of \$9,600 and \$412 in other receivables are factored in the budget proposal. Income from all sources for 1999 is projected to be equal to the proposed 1999 expenditures.

The decrease in Account 1203 (Retirement and Annuity) is due to the decision to create a single account reflecting DSBF employee annuity cost. That amount is shown in the 1999 budget proposal. Associational missionary annuity had been shown in that line item previously; however, associations paid that annuity. Subsequently, associational missionary annuity will be paid from designated pass-through accounts.

Account 1206 (Employee Insurance) has been increased because the Office Manager is on her husband's insurance. It is anticipated that she will retire at some time in 1999 and that her replacement would need the insurance provision.

Account 1214 (Church Retirement/Annuity) is a new entry. Previously these charges came from an Annuity Board credit which has been exhausted.

The North American Mission Board has committed a 4% salary increase to all personnel who are line-item entries on budget worksheets. The DSBF followed that 4% increase through with all employees.

Account 1321 (Bookkeeper) reflects NAMB participation although not on a 95/5 percentage basis.

Account 1335 (General Office Supplies) notes the decision to reduce operation accounts scattered throughout the budget and combine all purchases of office supplies into a single account. The additional amount also reflects supplies required by the new Language Missions Director position.

Account 1336 (Telephone Service) reflects the decision to use a global account for all telephone service including all long-distance calls originating from the office. Previously long-distance service was distributed throughout departmental budgets which created additional and unnecessary time-consuming bookkeeping.

Account 1337 (Equipment/Maintenance) has been increased based on the actual expenditure in 1997 and the condition of much of our equipment. Maintenance cost will also increase with the addition of a Language Missions Director.

The budgeted amount for audit (Account 1338) has been deleted. The Florida Baptist Convention assumes responsibilities for our audit.

Account 1340 is a 100% Cooperative Program account this year without the outside income from the sale of the Rapid City property. In previous years that income covered approximately half of the monthly payment on our existing building. There will be a single lump-sum payoff of the remaining balance on the Rapid City property on or about January 1, 1999, in the amount of \$36,000. That money will be held in escrow pending future decisions by the Executive Board regarding the DSBF building and its indebtedness.

Account 1342 (Workers' Compensation) reflects the actual cost which we project for workers' compensation. Confusion regarding cost has been clarified and that clarification indicates the need for the budgeted amount.

Account 1347 (Postal Expense) had not really been provided for anywhere in the budget. Each department assumed it was being cared for someplace. All postage will be charged against this global account which is a very close estimate of actual usage.

The \$4,000 budgeted for the new 800 telephone service is strictly an estimate. We do not have enough history with the account to know what we should budget. Adjustments may be necessary in the future either up or down.

All associational missionaries salary and travel is equalized in 1999. Individual accounts are broken out at the request of the Executive Board.

Account 1560 (Reservations Pastors R & R) is included at the request of pastors who work on reservations. It is their strong feeling that periodic time away from the reservation with their family is essential, although as a general rule they do not have personal funds to pay for it. This item will allow them to take time away when needed on an expense-reimbursement basis. Amounts to be reimbursed will be negotiated prior to the expense on a case-by-case basis.

Account 1564 which previously funded the state-wide ministers and wives conference will now fund an associational over-night retreat for ministers and wives. It is anticipated that there would not be 100% participation thereby making available approximately \$100 per couple. Programming would be planned on a local level. Any program expenses would be paid for on the local level.

State-wide conference child care (Account 1565) is a new item. Local hosts will be asked to find child care workers. The state will pay expenses for that care. Conferences covered by this account are the state annual meeting, evangelism conference, and any state-wide WMU or Women in Ministry event.

Account 1572 (PK Camp Scholarships) is inserted to offset the cost of camp for ministers' children who attend camp. This item surfaced as a need in discussions between pastors and the Executive Director. Pastors with more than one child felt particularly hard pressed to send multiple children to camp.

The Missions Conference (Account 1573) is for all pastors, not just mission pastors.

The New Church Methods Workshop (Account 1587) will offer assistance to pastors of new congregations and to those who are contemplating new churches. Skilled outside leadership will be used. The workshop is intended to be a companion emphasis to the simultaneous new-work probes in our six major metropolitan areas.

Funds for all Brotherhood work will be requisitioned as needed from the North American Mission Board.

It is anticipated that national WMU will provide \$4,750 for WMU operational and program needs. National WMU does not want the money to be shown as budget support; therefore, those funds will be placed in a designated account against which WMU operational and programming costs will be charged.

Funds for all LifeWay Ministries programming come from the agency. There are no Cooperative Program funds in these ministries in 1999 because of the carryover into 1999 of \$13,725 of designated money. There are some new emphases in 1999 such as youth; singles; and music councils; as well as marriage-counsel training for pastors and wives. The Campus Director's assistance does not include any Cooperative Program funds which means a decrease of \$2,840 from 1998, less \$1600 in designated funds for a net reduction of \$1240.

SUMMARY: The Cooperative Program budget for 1998 was set at \$218,622. The Cooperative Program budget base for 1999 is \$194,008 based on actual Cooperative Program income from July 1, 1997, through June 30, 1998. The downward adjustment in Cooperative Program income factored into the budget is due to the shift in philosophy from building budget on budget to building budget on income. Obviously the first year we move into this new system, 1999, causes some belt tightening. However, we will be on much safer ground with expenditures.

The budget makes allowance for some new needed program line items. Yet, there is no fat anywhere. New program items which have been highlighted above have been made possible in spite of the decrease in anticipated Cooperative Program income because of the elimination of a secretarial position in the state office and a decrease in the amount of support provided to student ministries. The amount of money budgeted for Student Ministries plus \$1600 designated funds should be adequate reimbursement for the time the Student Ministries Director will invest in state-wide student ministries in light of the fact that the Student Summer Missions program has been reassigned to Evangelism. The workload in the state office incurred by the vacant secretarial position will either have to be shifted to volunteers or simply set aside.

The Executive Board will have an opportunity in its annual March meeting to determine how to use any Cooperative Program funds received above budget and on hand at the end of preceding year. For instance, our 1999 budget calls for \$194,008 in Cooperative Program funds. Any amount above that would re-allocated in 2000 by Executive Board decision in March, 2000.

Annual Report Executive Director/Treasurer Report Jim Goodson/Interim

This report covers the time frame from May 1, 1998 through October 3. It deals with a few matters of interest to the entire Fellowship. Most of the issues noted in the report have been presented to the DSBF Executive Board.

I have been involved with the work in the Dakotas throughout the time of the Dakota-Florida partnership. That background provided the setting for our meetings with the Florida staff and partnership coordinators. We have ten projects planned with Florida in 1999 and 2000. Our two partnership coordinators (Nevi Townsend and Jim Hackney) have worked hard to involve Florida churches and associations with our folks. The Florida Convention also provided \$50,000 in pastoral aid; \$30,000 in new work grants; an \$11,000 grant for Northern Hills and a \$25,000 matching grant for FBC, Mandan.

Cooperative agreements have been presented to our associations in an effort to give them greater control over their DOAM program. Hopefully these agreements will enhance DSBF and associational teamship and reduce some of the abrasion we have experienced.

Currently there are four DOAM vacancies. Three of these positions are filled with interims.

We have an opportunity to move to solid financial status by continuing the newly installed procedure to build budget on income rather than budget. Even so, our cooperative program income continues to be below our capability and need.

New North American Mission Board pastoral aid guidelines pose a serious dilemma to some of our older churches which receive their help. The Florida Baptist Convention's \$50,000 and Baker offering receipts will significantly ease the hardship. The North American Mission Board has been and continues to be a generous partner in our work and intends to support our new work, which we desperately need, to the fullest possible extent.

New planning procedures enable us to do coordinated annual planning in partnership with associations. The process is primarily field-driven.

The DSBF personnel manual has been revised and extended. The same has occurred with DSBF committee and officer job descriptions in a manner consistent with By-laws.

Steve and Rita Osage joined our staff October 1, 1998. Steve will direct our language work.

James Hackney joined our staff October 2, 1998 as a volunteer stewardship and capital-fund raising director. James and Marge Hackney have been working in the Dakotas for several years as partnership coordinators.

The November mission pastors conference will have a new format this year as we try to meet needs all pastors have.

The work with the DSBF Executive Board has been extremely satisfying. The Board has been faithful to its assigned tasks, including that of finding a permanent Executive Director, Dr. Wilford D. "Doc" Lindsey. Brother Lindsey and I will have two weeks together before I return to my home in Florida.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have served you these past six months and to have worked with the DSBF staff.

Annual Report

CAMPUS MINISTRIES

Joe Todd Director

One of the greatest mission fiends in the Dakotas is the college and university campuses. The Lord continues to raise up volunteer student workers with a heart for students, though "the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few." This past year we had five (5) workers ministering on six (6) campuses. 126 students were reached in student ministry programs; seventy-one (71) students were active in Bible studies and programs; and three (3) students prayed to receive Christ.

Our major state-sponsored event was a Ski Retreat held at Foothills Community Baptist Church in Piedmont, South Dakota. Total attendance was 24, with students coming from Fargo/Moorhead, USD at Vermillion, and Rapid City. The students conducted the Sunday morning worship service for the church.

Because of the difficulty in getting our workers together, we conducted our first "Conference Call Training Event" in July. We had all four workers on the line with our "guest speaker," Bobby Pruett, BSU director at Colorado University in Boulder. The subject was, "Reaching Students in the Fall (With Little or No Money)."

Six (6) ethnic students and eighteen (18) International students were involved in Bible studies or Conversational English classes conducted by student ministries.

Eighteen (18) summer missionaries -- sixteen (16) sponsored through other state conventions and the NAMB, and two (2) with independent sponsorship -- served in seven (7) locations this summer.

Church Development Annual Report 1997-98

The 1997-98 year has been a year of change and transition. I have had to do much work in areas outside of my regular assignment of: Sunday School, Discipleship, Family, Music/Worship and Pastor/Staff. Much of my time and energy has been used in work with the Dakota Southern Baptist Foundation and other assignments. The following philosophy has been the engine for this year's activity:

Focus on Worship: The first annual worship-training event called Christian Arts Festival and a
worship training tour.

Focus on Children's Ministry: The first annual children's ministry conference. The children's ministry conference was the best-attended conference of all that we did.

3. Focus on continued Dakota Discoveries tours in the spring and fall: The last week in April and the last week in September continue to be the most productive church leadership training events. Our goal is to furnish a consultant for every church in the Dakotas during these two weeks.

4. Focus on Deacon Consultant Training: Deacon training and development has been a major request from churches the last two years.

5. Focus on Special Worker training The Dakota trained specialists that are available to Dakota Churches have not been used to their maximum. These people can meet a major part of training needs for our churches. This avenue of training is vital for healthy churches. We do not have to depend upon others for all of our training.

6. Focus on New Sunday Schools: We have made a major switch in our approach to encouraging and helping churches with New Sunday Schools. In the past, the Baptist Sunday School Board has made money available for a few new starts with a large investment of financial and materials resources. In the future, we will have the same amount of financial and materials resources but the focus will be to help every church in the Dakotas see new Sunday Schools as a workable strategy for reaching people.

Which of these three do you think proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell into the robbers' hands? And he said, 'The one who showed mercy toward him.' And Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same' (Luke 10:36-37 NASB).

Come Go With Me, the 1997-98 WMU emphasis, challenged the women to lead their churches to take a fresh look at needs outside the church walls and to start a new ministry. Also, WMU challenged more people to study Christ's response to human needs and to follow His example in witness and ministry. Come go with me was—and is—Christ's invitation to us all.

This was the theme for the **annual meeting** hosted by First Baptist Church, Williston, North Dakota. Berdena Sem chaired the local committees. BADLANDS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

It is truly an exciting time to be in the Badlands Association. Our churches continue to grow and reach people for the Lord. Presently we have two churches without pastors. These two churches are First Baptist Church of Watford City and the Belfield mission. The pastors and their laity are reporting the Lord at work in many areas. We continue to look forward with a very positive vision for the churches, missions, Bible studies and future mission sites.

AREA OF NEW WORK

This summer we zeroed in on Belfield, North Dakota. Many people helped the Vickery's in surveys, Bible Schools, Bible Classes and other ways in this rural North Dakota Town. We saw an enrollment of 55 pupils and a number of parents showed up for the last day. The follow-up visitations revealed an interest for a continuing work in the area. On July 19, the Belfield Baptist Church/mission started meeting. Currently the average Sunday attendance is 24 and the Tuesday and Wednesday Bible studies are averaging about 27.

SUMMER MISSIONARIES

A vital part of our summer work is done through the summer missionaries provided by the North American Mission Board and state Baptist Student Unions. This year we supervised five summer missionaries four from Florida and one from South Carolina. These five young ladies did a good job as they labored in four churches, two camps, a singles retreat and other places of future work.

CAMPS

Badlands Baptist Association held two camps this summer. The FAMILY CAMP, July 1-4, was well attended. Those who attended enjoyed the relaxed itinerary, fellowship, and dry weather. This camp is open to everyone. The 1998 campers are already planning for 1999. The CHILDREN'S CAMP, was an exciting success, with an enrollment of 62 and nine professions of faith. Tent camp is fun, but we did get a little wet with four inches of rain one night.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY'S ACTIVITIES

This year has been a very busy time for the Vickerys. We have traveled over the association often putting more than 25,000 miles so far this year on the vehicles, visiting with our pastors and preached in six of the churches and missions. We have also been involved with four mission schools, supervised five summer missionaries, and helped lead or work in the two associational camps. We have since called James Hackney, our Florida Representative, to serve as interim DOAM and he will begin working with us October 6, 1998. He had to go back to Florida to get his winter clothes. We welcome Jim and Marge to a North Dakota winter.

Central Association welcomes Steve and Cindi Saunders to our association. Steve accepted the pastorate of First Baptist, Mandan. Already they have had tremendous results as the attendance continues to increase, breaking the 100 mark frequently on Sunday mornings. They have agreed to be Camp Directors as Central is in the process of planning a Children's Camp this coming summer at Cross Roads Range.

First Baptist, Fort Yates (Phil Beffort-Pastor) had a tremendous (busy) summer as a group of 85 people from Planton, Alabama came to assist in summer mission work. They had a total of 4 Bible Schools with an enrollment of 450. This is on the Indian Reservation. Phil and Helen are still recuperating from all the activity. Phil has had to close two of the Indian works for the simple reason that he just couldn't handle it all. Our prayers go out to them both.

Vel and Sharon Hightower have closed down the work in Bismarck in order to assume the pastorate of the Rolla Baptist Mission. They moved there and have begun Bible Studies with a VBS this past summer. They had 40 enrolled in VBS.

North Hill, Minot did extensive remodeling this summer with the help of some work teams from the south. There were three different groups coming at three different times to accomplish this task. Pastor, Leroy Carpenter has had some physical problems this year. Remember him in your prayers.

At present there are three pastorless churches in Central. Trent Davis resigned from Prairie Baptist, Minot in order to become a Chaplin in the Air Force. Of course, they moved him immediately to Alabama. Troy Barber resigned Capitol Heights, Bismarck in order to further his education. Word of Life, New Salem continues to be pastorless at this time, however they have called a former pastor, Ruger Winchester as interim. Please pray for these churches as they continue to seek God's man to lead them.

Two of our pastors were flown to Tampa, Florida this past spring to meet with Pasco Association to pursue the possibility of a partnership venture. We are seeking a relationship that will be mutually beneficial, and not all one sided. Please pray for us.

Heartland Association Dean Manning, Associational Missionary (Interim)

I begin with an illustration from one of our congregations that speaks to the question of what and how we have been doing this past year. This past week I visited one of our churches and rejoiced with the Sunday School attendance record showing "60 people this past Sunday". Three years ago I was visiting that church and the attendance a week before our annual meting was 17.

While it is true that our Sunday School and worship attendance records do not show any significant increases, there are on the other hand many events and actions that clearly demonstrate that wonderful things are happening in our churches. I mention some. Two of our churches, Capitol Heights and Eagle's Wing have new buildings. Many of our churches have been able to renovate and repair their worship areas as well as their pastor's residences.

You conducted your first Children's Camp. Our churches reported wonderful attendances for our Bible School events. You have reported many exciting revival events. The evangelistic results from Bethany, Eagle's Wind and FBC Sisseton remind us that when we "go" and "tell" there is a harvest ready and waiting.

Two of our churches have received nearly \$93,000 in gifts and grants to assist them in their building projects. An Alabama family, Perry and Betty Broome have made a gift of \$32,000 as a low interest rate loan to one of our churches and when it is repaid that money becomes a part of the "Broome Heartland Loan Fund". Already it has grown by nearly another \$6,000 which is presently available for any of our churches to borrow from.

You have generously provided nearly \$5,000 in gifts to our pastors and congregations. In addition the Walton Association in Florida helped us provide a Christmas gift to each of our pastors. God has been good. His care has been constant. We have truly been blessed in this past year, and I am truly convinced we have been a blessing to many through our ministries.

Looking ahead we must understand that we are not doing enough to reach the lost, nor are we growing our Sunday Schools. It is imperative that each of us consider the need both as churches and the association to clearly state some objectives, goals and action plans that will guide us toward accomplishing the work our Lord has called us to in the Heartland area.

I believe it is in our interest to consider appointing a committee for the purpose of studying a need to revise our present guidelines. It is equally important that we nominate coordinators for our present program needs, then appoint a committee to prepare a job description for those leaders and any committees they might require in the future. It would be my hope that these needs can be met no later than our Semi-Annual meeting. A failure to describe what and how we are to do our task is tantamount to saying, "we are not planning on doing it".

Thank you for your prayers and felt support during this past year.

Overall, we had a very good year. However, there are unpleasant things to report first. The DSBF Executive Board took action in June to terminate our Director of Area Missions, Preston North after 17 years of service in the Dakotas. Our association unanimously disagreed with this action. The Executive Board also voted to exclude our representative, James Sabot, on a narrow and technical interpretation of the DSBF constitution. Unfortunately, in 1998 we had two churches disband, Crossroads in Moorhead and Calvary in Jamestown.

On the positive side, we had our youth camp for the second year and had 30 in attendance. We met at Valley City State University in Valley City and had 5 churches participate. While in the city we did 90 hours of community service and spent one evening with our youth doing surveys and probe work.

As an Association we held a Christmas Eve service that was attended by 80 people. We held a Maundy Thursday service and had a choir. We did both Mission Studies and accompanied them with fellowship meals. Our area sent 8 girls and 2 adults to the National Acteens Convention in Louisville, KY. Our people enjoy these times of fellowship and learning together.

At our request, the North American Mission Board helped us bring Karen White from Maryland to start a Baptist Student Union on the campus of North Dakota State University. Karen has called the group ACTS (Advancing Christ Through Students) and she began having Bible studies in September. Pray for her as she reaches out to the 19,000 students at NDSU and Moorhead State University.

Our Association was used by God to baptize 14 people.

Temple Baptist (Pastor Dude Garrett) put new siding on their building and repaired the parking lot. The people of all four of our churches performed all the labor for this project. We are thankful to the people of Temple Baptist for making their building available for many of our gatherings.

Living Hope (Pastor John Flowers) will be constituting by the end of the year. They have averaged 52 people this year; the largest church in SVBA. They have added new classes to their Sunday School, and they had 12 baptisms. Pray for them as they continue to search for the right property to buy and build on.

CONSTITUTION of the DAKOTA SOUTHERN BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP FOUNDATION

Article I.

NAME

This Foundation shall be called the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Article II.

MEMBERSHIP

The sole member of the Foundation is the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Article III. PURPOSE

This Foundation is organized, and will always operate, exclusively for religious purposes, and no part of the net earning of this corporation inure, or will ever inure, to the benefit of any individual or of any private shareholder, there being no shareholders. None of the income of this organization may inure to the benefit of any private individual or members and the assets of the Foundation are irrevocably dedicated to and for religious purposes, and upon dissolution of the Foundation, all of its property and affairs shall be liquidated in such manner as deemed advisable and advantageous by the Fellowship Executive Director, the Foundation Board of Directors and the Fellowship Executive Board. Property and proceeds of such liquidation shall be turned over to the Southern Baptist Foundation of Nashville, Tennessee, or its successor, or, if there be no such successor, then to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article IV. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Foundation shall be an Executive Director, President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall be the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Article V. DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors of the Foundation shall be six (6) elected by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship and serve in accordance with the Foundation ByLaws.

Article VI. FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTIONS AND FUNDS

Section 1. All restricted and unrestricted capital (corpus) funds will be raised by voluntary investments of individuals, groups, corporations, and churches. Additional funds received by the Foundation from the sale and/or use of property by bequest shall become restricted or unrestricted capital (corpus) funds. All monetary funds received by the Foundation by bequest shall become restricted or unrestricted capital (corpus) funds. Undesignated funds received shall be unrestricted capital (corpus), designated funds received shall be restricted capital (corpus).

- Section 2. All restricted capital (corpus) funds shall be invested in safe interest/dividend bearing bank accounts, Government Bonds, or Annuity Programs. All investments must be AA rating or better.
- Section 3. All unrestricted capital (corpus) if invested shall be invested in safe interest/dividend bearing bank accounts, Government Bonds, or Annuity Programs. All investments must be AA rating or better. Church loans may be authorized. The total of all church loans shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the unrestricted capital (corpus).
- Section 4. The investment of capital funds shall be managed by the Executive Director with concurrence of the Board of Directors of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.
- Section 5. Funds from the Foundation's investments of designated investments shall be used strictly according to the expressed will and direction of the donor.
- **Section 6.** Funds from the Foundation's investments of undesignated investments shall be used to accomplish the stated purpose of the Foundation. Any distribution of funds recommended by the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation must have concurrence of the majority of the Foundation Board of Directors.

BYLAWS of the DAKOTA SOUTHERN BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP FOUNDATION

ARTICLE I. TERRITORY

Section 1. The territory to be served by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation is North Dakota, South Dakota and other areas.

Section 2. The principle office of the Foundation shall be in the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship office in Bismarck, North Dakota.

ARTICLE II. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall be the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Section 2. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend ministers and laity to the Fellowship to serve as directors of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Section 3. There shall be at least six (6) members elected by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship to serve as directors of the Foundation in annual meeting of the Fellowship. These shall be elected in accordance with the Constitution and Bylaws governing the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Section 4. Elected members of the Foundation shall be maintained on a rotation basis with one-third (1/3) serving a one (1) year term, one-third (1/3) serving a two (2) year term, and one-third (1/3) serving a three (3) year term.

Section 5. The term of office for members of the Foundation shall be three (3) years. No member shall serve more than six (6) years until one (1) year has lapsed.

Section 6. Should vacancies occur for any and all reasons, on the Foundation Board, the Fellowship Nominating Committee shall bring recommendations to the Executive Board of the Fellowship to fill such vacancies until the next regular session of the Fellowship.

Section 7. The Board of Directors of the Foundation, at a special meeting called specifically for such purpose may, by majority vote recommend to the Executive Board of Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship the removal from office any one (1) or more of the directors.

Section 8. The Foundation shall organize itself by the election of a president, a vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer immediately following the annual meeting. The said officers shall serve for one (1) year and subject to reelection by the Board each year, serve for not more than three (3) years in any office. Removal of any officer during the normal business year shall be by majority vote of the Board of Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board. Any two (2) offices may be held by the same person except that one (1) person may not simultaneously hold the offices of president and secretary.

Section 9. The Foundation shall organize committees as is necessary for the fulfillment of its responsibilities and determine the authority of each committee.

Section 10. Each member of the Foundation shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church which is in cooperation with the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Section 11. A quorum at all meetings of the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall consist of a simple majority of the membership of the Board. A smaller number may, however, adjourn a meeting without further notice, until a quorum be secured. The act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting at which there is a quorum, shall be the act of the Board of Directors, except as otherwise provided by Statute or the Certificate of Incorporation.

Section 12. Regular meetings of the Board shall be held bi-annually at a time and place agreed on by the directors.

Section 13. Special meetings of the Board may be called at any time by the Executive Director of the Foundation, the President of the Board, or any three (3) Board members. Special meetings of the Board shall require a five-day (5) notice, given by phone, telegram, in person, in writing, or otherwise.

Section 14. The Board of Directors may, by resolutions adopted by the majority of members of the Board, designate two (2) or more directors to constitute an Executive Committee, which to the extent provided by resolutions, shall have authority to act with the authority of the Board of Directors in certain matters of management of the Foundation.

Section 15. Directors may receive reimbursements, deemed reasonable by the Board of Directors, for travel, food and lodging expenses incurred while attending regular meetings and/or special meetings of the Board of Directors in conducting the business of the Foundation.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS

Section 1. The elective officers of the Foundation shall be a president, one (1) vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer as described in Article II - Section 8.

Section 2. The Executive Director of the Board shall be the chief executive officer of the Foundation and officers and agents shall respectively exercise and perform such powers, duties, and functions as are generally exercised by like officers in corporate affairs, and as may be directed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The authority under which conveyances or encumbrances of all or any part of the corporate property may be made shall be by resolution of the Board of Directors. The persons who shall be authorized to execute the instruments of conveyance or encumbrance shall be the Executive Director, the President, the Vice-president or the Secretary.

ARTICLE IV. FINANCE

Section 1. The monies of the Foundation shall be deposited in the name of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation in such bank or banks or trust company of trust companies or saving institutions as the Board of Directors shall designate in keeping with the desires of the donors of said monies, and may be drawn out only on checks signed in the name of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation by such person or persons that the Board of Directors, by appropriate resolution may direct. Notes and commercial paper, when authorized by the Board, shall be signed in the name of the Foundation by such officer or agent or agents as authorized by the Board.

Section 2. The Board of Directors determine the rate of interest to be paid on restricted capital (corpus) by averaging the interest received from the many various investment accounts.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall manage the proceeds from the investments of unrestricted capital (corpus) to meet the purposes for which the Foundation was established.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have authority to make loans to churches for construction of, repair of, and additions to, new or existing buildings such loans shall not exceed ninety percent (90%) of the unrestricted capital (corpus). The rate of interest charged for such loans shall be determined by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall make a report of activities to the annual meeting of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

ARTICLE V. WAIVER OF NOTICE, ACTION WITHOUT MEETING

Section 1. Any member or director may waive, in writing, any notice required to be given him/her under these bylaws, whether before, at, or after the time stated therein.

Section 2. Any action which may be taken at a meeting of the directors may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the directors entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof.

ARTICLE VI. VOTING

Section 1. At each meeting of the Board of Directors of this Foundation, each Board member shall be entitled to one (1) vote.

Section 2. There shall be no proxy voting.

ARTICLE VII. SEAL

The Board of Directors shall provide a corporate seal, which shall be circular in form and shall be inscribed thereon the name of the Foundation and the words "Corporate Seal."

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship. The Foundation Board of Directors may make any suggestion of change to the Constitution Committee of the Executive Board of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Recommendation concerning changes shall come to the Fellowship through the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Executive Board.

The Foundation Board of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship respectfully submits this annual report of its activities during the 1997 church year.

3. WILLS

The Foundation decided to give \$100 to defray legal expenses for anyone who designates a gift to the Foundation in their will.

4. GRANTS: ELIGIBILITY

In its May meeting the Foundation changed its eligibility requirement for new work grants. The change makes all new work eligible, not just new work in urban areas. The change brings the DSBF grant program into compliance with the guidelines agreed to by DSBF and the Florida Baptist Convention.

6. NEW TRUST ACCOUNTS

The Foundation Board received notification in August that Perry and Betty Broome of Heartland Association have loaned \$32,000 to Eagles Wing with the stipulation that the loan plus 3% interest be repaid to the Foundation. The proceeds will be placed in the Broome/Heartland Loan Fund to serve as a new work revolving loan fund.

INVESTOR DEPOSITS

The Foundation Board voted August 10, 1998 to return investor's deposits with interest credited through September, 1998. The accounts require service levels beyond DSBF Foundation capability.

8. TRANSFER OF LOAN AND GRANT PROGRAMS

The DSBF loan and grant programs were transferred in August to the Executive Board. The rational was that these funds are program funds, not investment vehicles. Also, the Executive Board is better able to assess the viability of applications and to provide subsequent administrative oversight.

9. FOUNDATION DIRECTIONS.

DSBF needs exceed the level of income from all sources. Accordingly the Foundation Board has chosen to take deliberate steps to raise charitable gifts via wills and trusts.
