CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I:

NAME

This Fellowship shall be called the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

This Fellowship in session shall be composed of three (3) messengers per cooperating church with resident membership of fifty (50) or less and one (1) additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) resident members or majority fraction thereof or one (1) additional messenger for each \$500 contributed through the Cooperative Program, except that no church may have more than ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III:

PURPOSE

Section 1. This Fellowship is a nonprofit corporation through which Southern Baptist may work harmoniously in cooperation in promoting all enterprises they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

Section 2. This Fellowship, in keeping with its stated purpose, shall not attempt to exercise control over the cooperating churches.

Section 3. This Corporation in organized, and will always operate, exclusively for religious purposes, and no part of the net earnings of this Corporation inure, or will ever inure, to the benefit of any individual or of any private shareholder, there being no shareholders. None of the income of this organization may inure to the benefits of any private individual or members and the assets of the Corporation are irrevocably dedicated to and for religious purposes, and upon dissolution of the Corporation, the Executive Board of the Corporation will cause the assets of the Corporation to be distributed, after the payment of creditors, to an organization which will use said assets exclusively for religious purposes.

ARTICLE IV:

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Fellowship shall be a president, vice president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, and such other officers as the Fellowship may deem necessary.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the members present and voting at the annual meeting of the Fellowship. They shall take office at the close of the annual meeting, and hold office until their successors are elected and installed.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V:

EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Fellowship shall elect an Executive Board as set forth in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VI:

COMMITTEES

The committees of the Fellowship shall be a Nominating Committee, Program Committee, a Committee on Committees, and such other committees as are needed to carry out its work.

ARTICLE VII:

MEETINGS

Section 1. The Fellowship shall meet at such time and place as may be designated by the Fellowship at its annual meting.

Section 2. In an emergency the president of the Fellowship, acting in cooperation with the Executive Board, may change the time and /or place of the regular annual meeting.

Section 3. In an emergency the president of the Fellowship, acting in cooperation with the Executive Board, may call a special meeting of the Fellowship.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND FUNDS ARTICLE VIII:

Section 1. The Cooperative Program shall be the chief means through which the Fellowship shall support its missionary endeavors.

Section 2. All funds of this Fellowship shall be raised by voluntary contributions, provided this does not prevent acquiring of property by bequest or use of any income property that may be bequeathed to or purchased by the Fellowship.

Section 3. All designated gifts accepted by this Fellowship shall be used strictly according to the expressed will and direction of the donor.

AMENDMENTS ARTICLE IX:

This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

- Presenting copies of the proposed amendment(s) to the messengers while the Fellowship is in session.
- Proposed amendment(s) shall lies over until the next regular meeting of the (2) Fellowship.
- Proposed amendment(s) shall require two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers (3) voting.

BYLAWS

I: TERRITORY

The territory to be served by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship is North Dakota, South Dakota and other areas.

II: OFFICERS

Officers shall be elected annually. Officers shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot. The president and vice president shall be eligible to serve two(2) years in succession. Other officers may serve indefinitely.

III: EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend persons to the Fellowship for election to the Executive Board.

Section 2. The Board shall be elected to represent the total area and not as associational representatives.

Section 3. Each association with four (4) churches and two hundred (200) resident members may have one (1) Board member, and one (1) additional Board member when they reach four hundred (400), eight hundred (800), and twelve hundred (1200) resident members. No association may have more than four (4) Board members. One (1) representative from a language congregation shall serve a three (3) year term on the executive Board.

Section 4. Employees of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall not be eligible to serve on the Executive Board except as advisors or non voting ex officio members. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall serve as an advisory member and consultant to the Executive Board and all Fellowship committees.

Section 5. Board members eligible to serve are those who have been in the Fellowship area a minimum six (6) months and whose churches contribute at least quarterly through the Cooperative Frogram

Section 6. The term of office shall be three (3) years. Members elected to unexpired terms may

serve out the term and be eligible for one (1) full term. No member shall be eligible to serve more than six (6) years until a minimum of one (1) year has elapsed. A member moving from the association from which he/she has been chosen automatically goes off the Board.

Section 7. The Executive Board has authority to act for the Fellowship between regular meetings of the Fellowship except that it cannot impose its will on the Fellowship by rescinding or contradicting any action taken in a regular Fellowship meeting.

Section 8. Members of the Executive Board shall be elected by the Fellowship in session upon recommendation of the Fellowship nominating committee. The nominating committee may receive suggestions from the associations. The nominating committee shall appoint to the Executive Board to fill vacancies on the Board until such unexpired terms are filled by action of the Fellowship at the next regular meeting of the Fellowship.

Section 9. The president, vice president, recording secretary, and assistant recording secretary of the Fellowship shall be members of the Executive Board.

Section 10. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year on a date suggested by the Fellowship Director and approved by the Executive Board. Fifty percent (50%) of the() Board members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting.

Section 11. The Executive Board shall organize itself as described within the Executive Board Manual.

Section 12. The Executive Board shall act as the authorized legal agent for the Fellowship.

IV: AGENCIES

Section 1. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend ministers and laity to the Fellowship to serve as directors or trustees of all agencies.

Section 2. There shall be at least six (6) members elected to serve as directors or trustees of all agencies.

Section 3. Elected members of all agencies shall be maintained on a rotation basis with one-third (1/3) serving a one (1) year term, one-third)1/3) serving a two year term, and one-third (1/3) serving a three (3) year term.

Section 4. The term of office for members of all agencies shall be three (3) years. No member shall serve more than six (6) years until one (1) year has elapsed.

Section 5. Should vacancies occur on any agency, the Fellowship nominating committee shall, in consultation with the <u>directors of trustees and committees of agency</u>, bring recommendations to the Executive Board to fill such vacancies until the next regular session of the Fellowship.

Section 6. Every agency shall organize itself by the election of appropriate officers immediately following the annual meeting.

Section 7. Every agency shall organize committees and is necessary for the fulfillment of its responsibilities and determine the authority of each committee.

Section 8. Each member of every agency shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church which is in cooperation with the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

*Change: and shall have been in the Fellowship area a minimum of six (6) months and whose church contributes at least quarterly through the Cooperative Program.

V: FELLOWSHIP EMPLOYEES

Section 1. The Executive Board shall employ all Fellowship personnel, except office secretaries.

Section 2. The Executive Director shall employ all office secretaries in counsel with department directors.

Section 3. The Executive Director shall give general supervision and /or counsel to the work of the Fellowship through its departments and agencies. He shall receive and retain in the Fellowship office all historical data.

Section 4. The executive Director and all department directors shall present a written report of their stewardship the the Fellowship at the annual meeting.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall contract with all employed personnel on an indefinite time basis and a thirty-day (30) notice shall be given by either party of the desire to end the contract, except by mutual agreement.

Section 6. The Executive Director shall serve as ex-officio, without voting, on all committees, and aid by furnishing information, printed materials and needed guidance for the work of committees.

Section 7. There shall be a Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship policy manual () setting forth all policies, procedures and practices for all Fellowship employees.

Change: maintained by the Personnel Committee

VI: COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees shall consist of at least five (5) members appointed by the president of the Fellowship in consultation with the vice president of the Fellowship. This committee shall appoint the Resolutions Committee, the Time-Place-Preacher Committee, the Nominating Committee (). All special committees authorized by the Fellowship shall be appointed by the President of the Committee on Committee.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee, consisting of one representative from each association, () shall be responsible for nominating persons to the Executive Board and all Fellowship agencies.

* Change: represented on the Executive Board.

Section 3. The Program Committee of the Fellowship shall consist of the president, vice president, the Executive Director of the Fellowship, host pastor, the WMU president, the Brotherhood president, and the president of the Pastor's Conference.

Section 4. The president, vice president, and Fellowship Director shall serve as ex-officio members of all Fellowship committees of which they are not already a part.

Section 5. Ex-officio committee members shall serve in an advisory capacity only.

VII: AMENDMENTS

The Bylaws may be amended in the following manner:

- (1) At any regular meeting of the Fellowship except the last session.
- (2) An amendment must be presented in writing and copies made available to the messengers at either the first or second session.
- (3) Voted on at a stated time during subsequent sessions.
- (4) Received two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those voting.

VIII: RULES OF ORDER

The New Testament and Robert's Rule of Order Revised shall govern the conduct of the proceedings of the Fellowship, not otherwise provided for in the constitution and bylaws.

Chairman Atkinson then recommended that the Board accept the proposal for a professional review and a risk management evaluation be performed for the DSBF by Dr Banks and that Dr Banks be given an Honorarium for his work. There was a lot of discussion about the time frames and whether the Associations could also have a professional review, perhaps somewhere in the future. Many positive possibilities were mentioned. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.

Jim Pratt (representing the Finance/Constitution Committee of the DSBF Executive Board) recommends:

- 1. The Adoption of the proposed 2001 budget as it is presented. Discussion followed. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.
- 2. Regarding Executive Board member official travel:
 - a. Motel reservations be made through the DSBF office manager and be billed to the DSBF.
 - b. Members are encouraged to bring their spouse\family at the DSBF expense.
 - c. Members desiring immediate reimbursement must notify the office in advance so cash will be available for the reimbursement. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.
- 3. The responsibility for the processing (approving or rejecting) grants and loans be given to the foundation. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.
- 4. The Executive Director seek competitive bidding on phone and internet services with companies that reflect Christian Core Values and does not exceed the amount in the 2001 budget. This is to be accomplished prior to the March 2001 meeting. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.
- 5. The grant request by First Southern Baptist Church of Gregory be turned down because it does not meet the requirements for a grant. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the action.

Regarding issues in the area of the Constitution:

- 1. Regarding the matter of a Representative from South Valley: The Committee recommends we adhere to the guidelines stated in the by-laws of the DSBF Constitution Article III and section 3. Until such time as South Valley meets those requirements they are invited to send a fraternal representative to express concerns and recommendations to the board.
- 2. Concerning the <u>proposed</u> changes to the Constitution and by-laws which were read at the 1999 Fellowship Meeting, this Committee recommends that <u>no</u> actions be taken until after a risk management consultant reviews the Constitution, by-laws, and other related documents for clarity, consistency, and legality.

Discussion followed. The Board voted unanimously in favor of both the recommendations.

Executive Director Doc Lindsey presented his report using overhead visual aids demonstrating what all God has been doing in the Dakotas thru the DSBF. He shared the success of the Horse Whisperer Ministry and how our churches could request a date in 2001. He addressed the current needs at the State Office building and the construction that would need to be done to make it more functional.

Richard Farley gave us a written report from the Missions Development office with some encouraging words.

John Miller presented his report. The written report was in section 7. Items addressed included:

- 1. Faith Conference
- 2. Sunday School & Evangelism
- 3. Giving Support to Associational Sunday School Assist Teams.
- 4. Lay Leadership Training

Steve Osage gave a report on Language Missions. He shared about good experiences in Youth/Family Camp. (49 decisions were made)

Holly Lindsey gave the WMU report. She commended some of the churches for their generous giving to the Baker State Offering and encouraged us to reach the \$20,000 goal.

Kent Atkinson made a motion to approve the 2001 calendar. Jim Pratt seconded. The Board voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

Discussion was held concerning orientation of Executive Board Members. Suggestion was made to hold this at 7:30-8:30AM on the Saturday after the Annual Meeting. Much discussion followed. Consensus was that this would occur.

Jim Pratt made a motion to adjourn. Many seconded.

The meeting was closed in prayer.

Executive Director's Annual Report W. D. (Doc) Lindsey

On November 1, 2000, I will begin my third year as your State Executive Director, and I continue to celebrate the opportunity to work alongside you to reach these Dakotas with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As always, there is much to share about how the Lord is working in our midst.

Long Range Planning. One of the most pressing needs we have had as a Fellowship is a thorough long-range vision plan, not only for the Fellowship as a whole, but also for each association. This was one of the key items presented to me during the very first meetings of the DSBF Executive Director search committee. I am therefore happy to report that we now have such a vision plan for the years 2001-2006.

We began the process formally on October 18, 1999. At that time Hugh Townsend of the North American Mission Board was in Bismarck to chart the course. He and NAMB had committed the funds necessary for every association to have its own consultant. During the next several months these consultants assisted their assigned association to develop local based strategy plans. This process took a giant step forward on August 3, 2000, when the seven associations came together to present their local plans.

Following this meeting our DSBF staff met with Dr. Townsend and his consultants to see where the DSBF staff will intersect and support the associations in their stragegies. At this meeting NAMB agreed to continue to support the process with the previously mentioned consultants, who will make at least two follow up visits to their respective associations. This will improve our internal communication among the associations and Fellowship staff and will build in accountability for the entire process. It will also enable us to plan our calendar and budget to support the overall plan.

I am pleased with where we are in this long-range visioning process. Seems to me we have come a long way toward seeing where God is at work, and then responding with concrete planning for the present and future. I look forward to the day when the Dakota Fellowship will be recognized as a full fledged state convention, and believe that this planning process is one of the necessary major steps.

New Staff Person. On June 1, 2000, Richard Farley, his wife Debra and their daughters officially joined our Fellowship staff. Richard has two key roles. He is State Director of Missions, and also State Director of Evangelism. He and his family have served in a wide variety of denominational roles—overseas missionary, staff person with the former Home Mission Board, staff person with the Louisiana and George state conventions, and most recently on staff at the Atlanta Baptist Association in Atlanta, Georgia. It is good to have this capable

missionary on board, and we welcome also Debra and the four daughters, Rachel, Hannah, Sara and Rebekkah.

The Dakota Connection. In late 1999 we changed our process of publishing and mailing the Dakota Connection monthly newspaper. At that time we began publishing our paper as a part of the Lousiana Baptist Message. This was done for several reasons, chief among them controlling the costs of publishing and mailing the paper to our church members. To date we have published six month's worth, and the overwhelming response has been positive.

Publishing this way has some advantages as well as some disadvantages. Advantages include receiving national and international news about the Southern Baptist Convention, lowering overall costs, and sharing our Dakota stories with our 1600 partner congregations in the Louisiana Baptist Convention. But we are severely limited in the amount of news space we have in each edition, and it is difficult for some to distinguish our two pages from the remainder of the Louisiana Baptist Message. It should be remembered that this is not a permanent arrangement, but it is serving well for the present.

Partnership project with Louisiana Baptists. The partnership project with Louisiana Baptists is well underway and we have already benefited from it. Volunteers from across Louisiana have given of themselves and their resources to a variety of projects this summer, from Vacation Bible Schools to construction projects to the Christian Horse Whisperer. It is expected that this strategic alliance will grow stronger in the future.

Ukraine partnership. One of our long-range goals is to develop a meaningful overseas partnership in conjunction with the International Mission Board. We have tentatively identified Ukraine for this partnership, and anticipate an exploratory trip there in late spring of 2001. We can assist them in several ways, among them training pastors and other leaders, distributing Bibles and Christian literature, and helping them improve their farming processes.

Let me thank you again, brother and sister Dakotan, for the privilege and opportunity of serving with you in these beautiful states. May the Lord continue to bless and empower us for the momentous task of taking His Gospel to every city and places in our borders as well as overseas.

Collegiate Ministry Joe Todd

A. On Our College and University Campuses.

Our college and university campuses continue to be a major mission field for the Dakotas, with over 70,000 students in 26 institutions – including over 2,500 international students from all over the world.

This year we welcomed Cory Gonyo who is working with students at USD in Vermillion, SD and Kathleen Fladeland, who is having a Bible study with students in Dickinson, ND. We had to say good-bye to Karen White and James Sabot, both serving at NDSU in Fargo, ND. We had five (5) workers ministering on five (5) campuses. 126 students were reached in some way through student ministry programs; seventy-eight (78) students were active in Bible studies and other programs. Twenty-five (25) International students were involved in Bible studies or Conversational English classes conducted by student ministries. At least five (5) students prayed to receive Christ.

Student workers in the Dakotas this year were:

Karen White (semester missionary) Fargo/Moorhead Cory Gonyo – USD in Vermillion Kathleen Fladeland – Dickinson State University in Dickinson, ND Richard Tinsley (MSC Volunteer/semester missionary) Rapid City, area Joe Todd (MSC volunteer) Rapid City area

Our Winter Retreat was held at Camp Judson in the Black Hills. Total attendance was 25, with students coming from Fargo/Moorhead, Dickinson State, USD at Vermillion, and Rapid City.

Two students at USD served in overseas missions this summer: Moriah White served in London, England, and Savannah White served in Sydney, Australia.

B. Summer Missions

This was a turbulent year for Summer missions. We originally requested 20 summer missionaries and 4 sojourners (high school summer missionaries). Because of a shortage of students applying for summer missions in the U.S., some supervisors ended up recruiting their own summer missionaries, and still several needs were unmet. A total of eleven (11) summer missionaries and 4 sojourners served in the Dakotas during the summer of 2000.

The Dakotas has requested 14 collegiate summer missionaries for the summer of 2001.

Church Development Director's Report Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Annual Meeting, 2000

Beginning in 2001, we will be working from field service requests received from Associations. Also, we will spend more time helping state and association teams stay current and ready to help churches. This is a change in the way we have been doing business. It will take some time for us to get the process working well.

I will review important activities and opportunities in the Dakotas and as we seek to help churches become healthy.

Activities:

- 1. Three state Vacation School training teams were taken to Glorieta New Mexico for training in January. South Dakota, North Dakota and a Native American team were trained. These teams have been available to associations and churches.
- 2. Associational and DSBF state Sunday School Special Worker teams were trained in Minneapolis, Minnesota in February, 2000. These team have had the responsibility of interpreting the new "Sunday School for the Twenty First Century" Sunday School curriculum. A state team and three associations had complete age group teams at this event.

3. LifeWay Christian Resources sent a complete age group team to assist these associational and state teams in interpreting the new Sunday School curriculum in April, 2000.

- 4. Dakota children's workers conducted the third Children's Ministry Day, May, 2000. Children were involved with Children's Bible Drill, puppets, swimming and many other activities.
- 5. The first Senior Retreat in many years was held in Pierre, South Dakota in July, 2000.
- A "Pastor's Tools Tour" was held in August, 2000. This was an effort to help pastors with encouragement, skill training and challenge to become healthy.
- 7. A FAITH clinic was conducted with nine churches represented.

Opportunities:

- 1. We have an opportunity to work together as teams. The associations need to be very active in requesting training, consultations and help for their churches. Those of us in the state office need to be very diligent in discovering and providing resources requested by the associations.
- 2. We have an opportunity to pioneer new ways of reaching Dakotans for Christ and church members

LANGUAGE MISSION REPORT

God continues to show himself strong in the Dakotas as we have entered into a new millennium, exciting times are ahead as we look forward to the second coming of our Lord. At this writing the DSBF has a full staff, first time in a while. Four new Associational Missionaries on board this past year. Each association has implemented a strategy plan for reaching the lost. A strategy plan will also be in place for the Language works in early October.

In the new work area this year; Minot First Indian has a pastor and a rented building; Lower Brule has a pastor and addition to their new building a fellowship hall and three new class rooms; Mandaree Baptist has a new building; Cannonball under construction but on hold at this writing.

New works are in progress on the Spirit Lake Reservation at St. Michael's community near Ft. Totten and one in town at Devil's Lake, both are Native American. A Korean work is in progress at Grand Forks an a International group meeting under the leadership of Lon Cockerill in Fargo, a Hispanic work in Sioux Falls and a Korean work in Sioux City. Associational Missionaries doing good work in these areas.

Language pastor and wife conference well attended in May; Youth Conference in June enrolled 154 with 32 professions of faith, director of camp was Delbert Hopkins who surrendered to Ministry at camp the year before; Family camp saw 17 come to know the Lord in July and 2 were saved at the Reservation Crusade in August making a total of 51 professions of faith.

My wife Rita and I also had the privilege of taking a Native American team for VBS training in Glorieta in January, Conducted Cross Culture Training in Scotts Bluff Nebraska in April and taught classes on Home Mission Study at Indian Falls Creek, Oklahoma in June. At Falls Creek 154 professions of faith were recorded under the preaching of Rev. Richard Pickup.

Dot Carpenter, Dakota WMU President served on the nominating committee.

The **Dakota WMU Council** met for its annual planning session in February in Bismarck. It is at this time that recommendations are made concerning the Baker Missions Offering, RefresHer, Annual Meeting, and Acteen Impact.

Acteen Impact was hosted by North Hills Baptist Church, Minot, ND on June 22-24, 2000. This event is open to all teenage girls in the Dakotas. Leaders came from Oklahoma, Kenya, Sturgis SD, and New Salem ND. The Dakota Acteens are ably led by Janet Angell.

Mobridge, South Dakota was the site of **RefresHer** on September 8-10, 2000. Registered attendance was 85 with several guests also attending some of the general sessions. Leaders included Debra Farley, worship; Camille Simmons, San Antonio TX, Bible Study; Phyllis Merritt, San Antonio TX, Project Help: Literacy emphasis; and Carol Hylden, Nairobi, Kenya, missionary.

THE DAKOTA CONNECTION The Monthly Newspaper of The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship

PURPOSE: The purpose of the Dakota Connection is to feature events and activities of the Southern Baptist Churches in North & South Dakota.

VISION: In March 2000 Doc Lindsey shared his vision with me of "connecting" our Dakota Connection with Louisiana's Weekly Newspaper The Baptist Message. His vision was for a new editor to develop a partnership with Louisiana's Baptist Message staff to include our Dakota Connection once per month as its final page. In this arrangement The Baptist Message staff would do three costly things-1) PROCESS OUR PRINTING; 2) DO ALL OUR MAILING; and 3) MAINTAIN OUR MAILING LIST. Remarkably, The Baptist Message could do all three of these for the cost of 20 cents per copy. Our cost to do our own using local printers, paper, secretarial labor for the upkeep of accurate mailing list would be several cents more a copy. He explained that if we couple the savings with the added news from Louisiana that the Dakotas would be practicing good stewardship to enter into this arrangement. In addition to these advantages there would also be the regular reminder to our people that we are exploring and developing a working relationship with The Louisiana Baptist Convention as our partnership with Florida is phasing out. All that was needed was an editor.

NEW BEGINNING: After much prayer in March of 2000 I accepted the position of editor. We began in April by acquiring all the new computer hardware and software that we needed and I set up an office in the library of the DSBF office. Our first new edition of *The Dakota Connection* came from Louisiana in May 2000. Each month has been an opportunity to explore possible formats that will best serve the Dakota churches. At the writing of this report it is still so new that it can be expected to change for a few more months until a suitable format emerges.

2000-2001 GOALS: 76 churches...14 missions...7 associations and 2 pages. My number one goal is to improve each month with the quality of reporting and layout. My second highest priority is to improve communication between myself and all the sources of news. Thirdly, I want to improve the process of electronic layout that includes the use of digital pictures. Finally, I want to improve the manner of communicating the actual finished product to Louisiana with the use of the Internet.

PERSONAL NOTE: I want to thank Doc Lindsey for giving me the opportunity to work with our DSBF as the DC editor. The job is allowing me to develop and improve skills that I have long desired to employ. It is a joy to work with the DSBF staff each week and I look forward to the year ahead. And, please call me with newsworthy events and activities.

It is a joy hearing the dreams of the pastors, and laity talk about what is going on in their churches and the plans they have. These plans include starting new work in Crosby, Beach, Faith and on the Fort Berthold Reservation. It will be interesting to see the strategy unfold over the next four or five years.

ASSOCIATION ACTIVITIES

One main goal has been to work on the long-range strategy for the Badlands Association. The plan is still under construction with much to be completed in the next few years. One priority that has surfaced is the starting of Bible Studies, preaching points, missions and churches in the area. The Badlands Association is building a strategy for reaching the rural areas and putting together a "Feeding Disaster Unit" through the DSBF.

Thus far this year the leaders of the association have put together an Evangelism Conference in February with about 100 attending, the Semi-Annual meeting in March with 50 attending, the Badlands Ladies Retreat was in April with more than 40 attending in an ice storm. May was a busy month with an Interfaith Witness Seminar, a construction team came and work on the office and missionary's home. We also had our second Strategy Planning retreat in May. June, July and August are the busy months in the association. To this point, we have had at least nine mission teams to come from South Carolina, Tennessee, Louisiana, Florida, Arizona, Alabama, and Missouri. These teams have labored in surveys, Vacation Bible Schools, camps, construction work, and offered comfort and support to the churches and pastors.

We welcome three new pastors/associate pastors to our association. Robert Hlibichuk is preaching in Belfield, James "Budg" Reikeman is the new pastor at Williston and Myron Grueneich is the associate pastor in Williston and will also be working to develop missions and strengthen the mission work in the association.

CONSTITUTION of the DAKOTA SOUTHERN BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP FOUNDATION

Article I.

NAME

This Foundation shall be called the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Article II.

MEMBERSHIP

The sole member of the Foundation is the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Article III. PURPOSE

This Foundation is organized, and will always operate, exclusively for religious purposes, and no part of the net earning of this corporation inure, or will ever inure, to the benefit of any individual or of any private shareholder, there being no shareholders. None of the income of this organization may inure to the benefit of any private individual or members and the assets of the Foundation are irrevocably dedicated to and for religious purposes, and upon dissolution of the Foundation, all of its property and affairs shall be liquidated in such manner as deemed advisable and advantageous by the Fellowship Executive Director, the Foundation Board of Directors and the Fellowship Executive Board. Property and proceeds of such liquidation shall be turned over to the Southern Baptist Foundation of Nashville, Tennessee, or its successor, or, if there be no such successor, then to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article IV.

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Foundation shall be an Executive Director, President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall be the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Article V.

DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors of the Foundation shall be six (6) elected by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship and serve in accordance with the Foundation ByLaws.

Article VI.

FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTIONS AND FUNDS

Section 1. All restricted and unrestricted capital (corpus) funds will be raised by voluntary investments of individuals, groups, corporations, and churches. Additional funds received by the Foundation from the sale and/or use of property by bequest shall become restricted or unrestricted capital (corpus) funds. All monetary funds received by the Foundation by bequest shall become restricted or unrestricted capital (corpus) funds. Undesignated funds received shall be unrestricted capital (corpus), designated funds received shall be restricted capital (corpus).

- Section 2. All restricted capital (corpus) funds shall be invested in safe interest/dividend bearing bank accounts, Government Bonds, or Annuity Programs. All investments must be AA rating or better.
- Section 3. All unrestricted capital (corpus) if invested shall be invested in safe interest/dividend bearing bank accounts, Government Bonds, or Annuity Programs. All investments must be AA rating or better. Church loans may be authorized. The total of all church loans shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the unrestricted capital (corpus).
- **Section 4**. The investment of capital funds shall be managed by the Executive Director with concurrence of the Board of Directors of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.
- Section 5. Funds from the Foundation's investments of designated investments shall be used strictly according to the expressed will and direction of the donor.
- Section 6. Funds from the Foundation's investments of undesignated investments shall be used to accomplish the stated purpose of the Foundation. Any distribution of funds recommended by the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation must have concurrence of the majority of the Foundation Board of Directors.

BYLAWS of the DAKOTA SOUTHERN BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP FOUNDATION

ARTICLE I. TERRITORY

Section 1. The territory to be served by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation is North Dakota. South Dakota and other areas.

Section 2. The principle office of the Foundation shall be in the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship office in Bismarck, North Dakota.

ARTICLE II. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship shall be the Executive Director of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Section 2. The Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Nominating Committee shall recommend ministers and laity to the Fellowship to serve as directors of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation.

Section 3. There shall be at least six (6) members elected by the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship to serve as directors of the Foundation in annual meeting of the Fellowship. These shall be elected in accordance with the Constitution and Bylaws governing the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Section 4. Elected members of the Foundation shall be maintained on a rotation basis with one-third (1/3) serving a one (1) year term, one-third (1/3) serving a two (2) year term, and one-third (1/3) serving a three (3) year term.

Section 5. The term of office for members of the Foundation shall be three (3) years. No member shall serve more than six (6) years until one (1) year has lapsed.

Section 6. Should vacancies occur for any and all reasons, on the Foundation Board, the Fellowship Nominating Committee shall bring recommendations to the Executive Board of the Fellowship to fill such vacancies until the next regular session of the Fellowship.

Section 7. The Board of Directors of the Foundation, at a special meeting called specifically for such purpose may, by majority vote recommend to the Executive Board of Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship the removal from office any one (1) or more of the directors.

Section 8. The Foundation shall organize itself by the election of a president, a vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer immediately following the annual meeting. The said officers shall serve for one (1) year and subject to reelection by the Board each year, serve for not more than three (3) years in any office. Removal of any officer during the normal business year shall be by majority vote of the Board of Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board. Any two (2) offices may be held by the same person except that one (1) person may not simultaneously hold the offices of president and secretary.

Section 9. The Foundation shall organize committees as is necessary for the fulfillment of its responsibilities and determine the authority of each committee.

Section 10. Each member of the Foundation shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church which is in cooperation with the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Section 11. A quorum at all meetings of the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall consist of a simple majority of the membership of the Board. A smaller number may, however, adjourn a meeting without further notice, until a quorum be secured. The act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting at which there is a quorum, shall be the act of the Board of Directors, except as otherwise provided by Statute or the Certificate of Incorporation.

Section 12. Regular meetings of the Board shall be held bi-annually at a time and place agreed on by the directors.

Section 13. Special meetings of the Board may be called at any time by the Executive Director of the Foundation, the President of the Board, or any three (3) Board members. Special meetings of the Board shall require a five-day (5) notice, given by phone, telegram, in person, in writing, or otherwise.

Section 14. The Board of Directors may, by resolutions adopted by the majority of members of the Board, designate two (2) or more directors to constitute an Executive Committee, which to the extent provided by resolutions, shall have authority to act with the authority of the Board of Directors in certain matters of management of the Foundation.

Section 15. Directors may receive reimbursements, deemed reasonable by the Board of Directors, for travel, food and lodging expenses incurred while attending regular meetings and/or special meetings of the Board of Directors in conducting the business of the Foundation.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS

Section 1. The elective officers of the Foundation shall be a president, one (1) vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer as described in Article II - Section 8.

Section 2. The Executive Director of the Board shall be the chief executive officer of the Foundation and officers and agents shall respectively exercise and perform such powers, duties, and functions as are generally exercised by like officers in corporate affairs, and as may be directed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The authority under which conveyances or encumbrances of all or any part of the corporate property may be made shall be by resolution of the Board of Directors. The persons who shall be authorized to execute the instruments of conveyance or encumbrance shall be the Executive Director, the President, the Vice-president or the Secretary.

ARTICLE IV. FINANCE

Section 1. The monies of the Foundation shall be deposited in the name of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation in such bank or banks or trust company of trust companies or saving institutions as the Board of Directors shall designate in keeping with the desires of the donors of said monies, and may be drawn out only on checks signed in the name of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Foundation by such person or persons that the Board of Directors, by appropriate resolution may direct. Notes and commercial paper, when authorized by the Board, shall be signed in the name of the Foundation by such officer or agent or agents as authorized by the Board.

Section 2. The Board of Directors determine the rate of interest to be paid on restricted capital (corpus)

by averaging the interest received from the many various investment accounts.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall manage the proceeds from the investments of unrestricted capital (corpus) to meet the purposes for which the Foundation was established.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have authority to make loans to churches for construction of, repair of, and additions to, new or existing buildings such loans shall not exceed ninety percent (90%) of the unrestricted capital (corpus). The rate of interest charged for such loans shall be determined by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall make a report of activities to the annual meeting of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

ARTICLE V. WAIVER OF NOTICE, ACTION WITHOUT MEETING

Section 1. Any member or director may waive, in writing, any notice required to be given him/her under these bylaws, whether before, at, or after the time stated therein.

Section 2. Any action which may be taken at a meeting of the directors may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the directors entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof.

ARTICLE VI. VOTING

Section 1. At each meeting of the Board of Directors of this Foundation, each Board member shall be entitled to one (1) vote.

Section 2. There shall be no proxy voting.

ARTICLE VII. SEAL

The Board of Directors shall provide a corporate seal, which shall be circular in form and shall be inscribed thereon the name of the Foundation and the words "Corporate Seal."

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship. The Foundation Board of Directors may make any suggestion of change to the Constitution Committee of the Executive Board of the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship.

Recommendation concerning changes shall come to the Fellowship through the Dakota Southern Baptist Fellowship Executive Board.
